

Ruddigore did not originally do very well in its reviews. However, ultimately it proved very popular, profitable and has gone on to influence many shows from Ruddy George (a.k.a. Robin Redbreast) a burlesque, to Me and My Girl, Thoroughly Modern Millie, Spitting Image, Doctor Who and of course Harry Potter.

I am delighted that this year we are supporting St Loye's Foundation who have been providing employment and training services years ago, and my first public performances were for people with disabilities and chronic health

JANE MAY

Director

Tane just couldn't resist the opportunity to direct her all time favourite Gilbert and Sullivan Opera for St David's Players. Ruddigore was the first ever production she saw, when her Mum and Dad were performing the roles of Mad Margaret and Robin Oakapple at the Pavilion Theatre, Torquay.

Some twenty five or so years on, Mad Margaret was Jane's first major role with St David's Players in our 1991 production of Ruddigore, in her opinion the best female part in all the Gilbert and Sullivan Operas.

Jane has thoroughly enjoyed directing her tenth production for St David's Players and appreciates all the hard work from the cast, committee and back stage crew needed to make this a success.



MARK PERRY

Musical Director

Mark's first recollection of 'am-dram' was in his teens, being cast as The Serpent in a play about the Creation, and that more or less set the tone for a number of things to come...

He became involved with musical am-dram through the St David's Players in 1981, as one of the piano duettists for The Mikado. In 1983 he performed on stage as Strephon in Iolanthe (no-one else auditioned) and his performance so stunned the critics that he was placed firmly back in the orchestra pit the following year, where he has remained ever since. He has either musically directed or accompanied nearly all the

performance of Ruddigore leaves only Princess Ida, Thespis, Patience and Cox & Box to do!

In between the 'G'-ing and 'S'-ing, Mark has musically directed Fiddler on the Roof, The Sound of Music, Bitter Sweet, My Fair Lady, Tom Jones (the musical, not the Welshman) and Guys and Dolls with Exmouth Amateur Operatic Society, now Exmouth Musical Theatre Company.

Mark has been delighted to work with Jane on Ruddigore. Rehearsals have been great fun, as ever, and very exciting too. He's been told by the cast that the song 'Oh, why am I moody and Gilbert and Sullivan operettas, and this week's sad?' seemed to have a particular relevance...

Notice something different?

ilbert and Sullivan enthusiasts may notice that the version of *Ruddigore* you are watching is very slightly different from the more commonly performed opera.

Sullivan scholar David Russell-Hulme prepared this edition of Ruddigore from Sir Arthur Sullivan's autograph score for the New Sadler's Wells centenary revival in 1987

The dialogue is as it was being performed when the original production closed at the Savov in 1887 and is therefore as Gilbert and Sullivan left it and intended it to be performed

Musically there are a number of differences to a far more spectacular version in which the from the 'standard' version which, it needs to be remembered, was an adapted version of the opera prepared in 1919/1920 and so without permission from either Gilbert or Sullivan (both being dead). The act two finale was presented in two versions during the original run. Both start with 'When a man has been a naughty baronet,' the difference being that for the first few nights the reprise of 'Oh, happy the lily' reverted to the original § time as in Act One. Gilbert and Sullivan changed very quickly quite unique!

reprise 'For happy the lily' is in common time (½) – this was their preferred version and is the one presented here today. It is also worth noting that this finale and the finale to Utopia are the only two occasions in Gilbert and Sullivan where the finale is not a mere repeat of music already heard earlier in the opera.

Otherwise the production of the opera is not affected, other than that you will have a far more authentic Ruddigore which sounds

libert used phrases Jin his Ruddigore libretti that were in vogue at the time of writing.

- AMARYLLIS: Girl's name in use in classical and pastoral poetry. ('Welcome, gentry' - Chorus)
- VALLEY-DE-SHAM: Victorian English pronunciation of valet de chambre, a personal male servant. (I once was as meek as a new born lamb' - Sir Ruthven and Old Adam)
- LANTERN CHAPS: Long bony jaws ('When the night wind howls' - Sir Roderic)
- PENNY READINGS: Meetings at which readings from ones own or another's writings would be given. The admission was usually one penny. (I once was a very abandoned person - Mad Margaret and Sir Despard)
- PARLEYVOO:

Obviously a parody, this upset the French newspaper 'Le Figaro' which wrote that the song was an insult to the French nation and navy. Gilbert replied that the French would have used terms like 'Rosbif' to ridicule Les Anglais! ('I shipp'd d'ye see' - Richard Dauntless)

- GIDEON CRAWLE: This is assumed to be Old Adam's real name.
- In one episode of the 1980s ITV series Spitting Image, Neil Kinnock parodied the 'Matter' patter song!

Ruddigore or The Witch's Curse

Lyrics and Libretto by WSGILBERT Music by ARTHUR SULLIVAN

Act I

In the seaside village of Rederring, Lin Cornwall, a chorus of professional bridesmaids frets that there have been no weddings for the last six months and they hope Rose Maybud will oblige. They ask Rose's aunt, Dame Hannah, if she might consider marriage, but her betrothed turned out to be Sir Roderic Murgatrovd, one of the bad baronets of Ruddigore. She tells of the curse placed on all who hold that title - they must commit a crime a day or perish in dreadful agony! Rose takes her ideas of right and wrong from a book of etiquette and finds all the young men she meets either too rude or too shy.

Avoiding the curse

To avoid inheriting the family curse, Sir Ruthven Murgatroyd has fled the ancestral home and, disguised as Robin Oakapple, settled in Rederring. Here he has fallen in love with Rose Maybud but, too shy to develop the relationship himself, he calls upon Richard Dauntless (Robin's foster brother) to court Rose for him. Overcome by Rose's beauty, Richard sets about capturing her for himself and nearly succeeds in doing so until Robin finally declares his love for her and wins her back.

Mad Margaret has been driven to madness by her love for Sir Despard, the current 'Bad Baronet.' She is jealously seeking Rose Maybud, having heard that Sir Despard intends to carry Rose off as one of his daily crimes. Rose tells her that she is pledged to another. Sir Despard bemoans his fate of having to commit a daily crime and feels obliged to reveal Robin's true identity.

Deception revealed

The village gathers to celebrate the nuptials of Rose and Robin. Sir Despard interrupts, revealing that Robin is his elder brother and must accept his rightful title as the Bad Baronet. Rose, horrified at Robin's true identity, resolves to marry Despard - who refuses her: now free of the curse, the ex-baronet takes up with his old love and fiancée Mad Margaret. Rose then accepts Richard, as he 'is the only one that's left.' Robin leaves to take up his rightful identity as Sir Ruthven Murgatroyd.

Act II

Act Two opens in the picture gallery of Ruddigore Castle, now the home of Sir Ruthven (Robin). Robin finds that wickedness does not come naturally to him. His weak crimes stir the ancestral ghosts who come alive from their portraits to give him a taste of the torments to come if he refuses to commit a daily crime. Sir Roderic, Robin's immediate predecessor, suggests he carries off a lady from the village.

A new start

Meanwhile, Despard has atoned for his previous ten years of evil acts and has married Mad Margaret and the two persuade Ruthven to give up his life of crime. He vows to talk to Sir Roderic, but Old Adam returns having carried off Dame Hannah - whose fury is violent! Answering Robin's call for help, Sir Roderic comes face to face with his one time fiancée.

A way out

In a flash of inspiration, Robin realises that a baronet of Ruddigore who refuses to commit the daily crime must die and, therefore, to make such a refusal is tantamount to suicide; which is a crime in itself. Consequently, Sir Roderic 'ought never to have died' and the curse should not have been handed on. Sir Roderic, now 'practically alive,' is free to marry Dame Hannah, Robin can reclaim Rose and Richard settles for the First Bridesmaid, Zorah.

uddigore or 'The Witch's Curse,' originally called *Ruddygore*, is the tenth of fourteen 'Savoy Operas' written by Gilbert and Sullivan. It was first performed by the D'Oyly Carte Opera Company at the Savoy Theatre in London on 22nd January 1887. The first night was not altogether a success, as critics and the audience felt that Ruddygore did not measure up to its predecessor, The Mikado. After some changes, including respelling the title, it achieved a run of 288 performances.

There were further changes and cuts, including a new overture, when Rupert D'Oyly Carte revived Ruddigore after the First World War.

Pormed in late 1969 by members of the choir of St David's Church, Exeter, St David's Players' aim was to raise funds for the Biafran crisis. The first production, Patience, was such a success that it was decided to form a permanent company.

For the first couple of years the Society presented two productions a production a year has been normal.

St David's Players have built a formidable reputation for staging Gilbert and/or Sullivan productions to the highest possible standard, initially accompanied by two pianos, but since 1985, by an orchestra.

Over the past 44 years the Society has presented all the Gilbert and Sullivan operas with the exception of *Thespis* for which, although there are several adaptations, a major proportion of Sullivan's original music has been lost.

St David's Players have introduced Exeter, East and Mid Devon to the delights of Utopia

(Limited), The Grand Duke, and also to a number of Sullivan's non-Gilbert works, including The Zoo, The Rose of Persia and The Emerald Isle. In 1999 the Society had the honour of being commissioned by the Arthur Sullivan Society to perform The Emerald Isle at the International Gilbert and Sullivan Festival in Buxton, Derbyshire.

We rehearse in central Exeter from April to October each year with a performance at the end of that period. Rehearsals are great fun and we are always delighted to welcome new members both on stage as performers and off stage as helpers.

We also arrange various social events throughout the year including trips to other productions by local companies.



The partnership of *William Schwenck Gilbert* and *Arthur Seymour Sullivan*is probably the most remarkable collaboration in the history of the musical theatre to date.

During a period of 25 years (1871 – 1896) the partners produced a series of 14 comic operas and one Cantata which, not only created an entirely new genre of British musical theatre and also revolutionised the art of stage direction, but also laid the foundation for all musicals that have followed.

Their comic operas became known collectively as the 'Savoy Operas,' named after the theatre built by impresario Richard D'Oyly Carte in which to present them by an opera company which, from 1875 until it disbanded in 1982, bore his name.



WS Gilbert

ilbert, born in 1836, became a much Grespected theatre critic, writer of short stories and a series of comic poems known as the 'Bab' Ballads, which overshadow the works of Hood, Carroll and Lear. His first acknowledged stage work, a burlesque of Donizetti's L'Elisir d'Amore, appeared in London during 1866, although his first play, Uncle Baby (written under a pseudonym) appeared as early as 1863. A series of burlesques, dramas, comedies and comic operas followed, and it was seldom during the 1870s and 1880s that there were less than half a dozen Gilbert works playing in various London theatres at any one time, with many more in the provinces. The comedy, Engaged, still holds the stage to this day and is generally acknowledged to be the forerunner of Wilde's Importance Of Being Ernest. In total Gilbert has almost 70 stage works to his name.

Arthur Sullivan

(1842-190

Cullivan, whose father was a military band master and also a theatre musician. was born in 1842 and by the age of eight was able to play every wind instrument. At 12, Sullivan became a chorister in the Chapel Royal and at 16 won the prestigious Mendelssohn Scholarship allowing him to study at the Royal Academy of music and, for two years, at Leipzig. His first major work - incidental music to Shakespeare's Tempest, immediately won him fame in 1862 and a string of cantatas, oratorios, ballets, operas, church music, chamber music and ballads followed. He was nominally Master of the Queen's Music until his early death in 1900. His works (apart from Gilbert) were sidelined for many years by the musical establishment. However, during the last 25 years or so, his work has started to regain the position it so richly deserves.

'The Martyr of Antioch was staged as an opera in the late 1890s, and was toured by Carl Rosa, never by D'Oyly Carte. It never played at the Savoy Theatre, and is not recognised as one of the 'Savoy Operas.'



or most people, the years spent at school are crucial to developing the key skills which will equip them for the rest of their lives. Deciding on which school to send your child to is therefore of vital importance, not only in determining his or her university prospects and eventual career, but also in establishing what sort of person he or she will turn out to be.

At Exeter School, the staff recognises that education does not begin and end in the classroom. Emphasis is placed on extra-curricular activities as well as on stimulating academic ambition. A constant hub of activity, Exeter School is a vibrant, happy and lively place to be.

A selective co-educational day school from the age of seven, about 200 pupils attend the Junior School (Years 3-6) and 700 the Senior School (Years 7-13), including the 200 strong Sixth Form.

Major productions are staged throughout the year and in the current academic year these have included the Choral Society's rendition of Verdi's Gloria, Finzi's Ode to St Cecilia and Vaughan Williams' Serenade to Music in Exeter Cathedral, the Senior School play An Italian Straw Hat, the Middle School play Ernie's Incredible Illucinations and the Junior School play, Rock Finz.

Nearly 500 music lessons a week are taken by pupils, who also play in four orchestras, seven chamber ensembles, eight choirs, two brass ensembles, three jazz bands and a samba drum troupe.

The site is well equipped with a range of first-class sports facilities and offers around 20 different sports. In addition to the large playing fields, the school has its own astro turf arena, heated outdoor swimming pool, sports hall, fitness suite, dance

studio and all weather courts. There is a wide range of sporting activities with something to suit all tastes.

Older pupils also have the opportunity to join the school's Combined Cadet Force as well as taking part in outdoor pursuits such as the Ten Tors Challenge, the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme and the British Exploring Society. There are around 15 annual tours and expeditions, including Spain, Israel, Indian Himalayas and Sri Lanka in 2013/14.

The school has an excellent record of academic success including 35 Oxbridge offers in the last five years. In the Summer 2014 public exams, 56% of A Level and 82.5% of GCSE grades were A* or A. Exeter School was deemed 'excellent' in the latest inspection report which stated: "Pupils throughout the school are extremely successful in an impressively wide range of activities. The school clearly fulfils its aims of realising the personal potential of each pupil by the time they leave the school."
